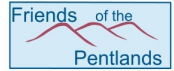

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Castlelaw Hill Fort and Earth House

This monument is cared for by Historic Scotland. Excavation has revealed a long history of fortification that is typical of the later 1st millennium BC in south-east Scotland. Originally a farming community, later ramparts and ditches were added, making the fort a very formidable feature in the rolling landscape of the Pentland Hills. Entry is free and available at all times.
